The sweetest cat of Instagram, Miss Tipsy has invited me to participate in this marvellous Christmas issue and I couldn't feel more flattered. My name is Flango. I am a pink two-year-old small flamingo who lives in Santiago, the capital of my country, Chile.

First, I want to mention that here in Santiago of Chile, located in the Southern hemisphere, we are far from celebrating a white and cold Christmas. On the contrary, Christmas is just in the middle of summer, with an average of 30 degrees Celsius (86 degrees Fahrenheit) during daytime, which is perfect for me since I enjoy hot and sunny weather. So, humans and plushies go shopping, drinking cold water, and in most cases, wearing a trendy hat and sunglasses. It is recommendable, then, to go to the shopping centres before midday if it is possible

Some of the most popular malls are Parque Arauco and Costanera Center. Many humans wait until the last minute to attend

these places



and that is why they are always pretty crowded and they even extend their times and schedules so more humans and plushies can go and buy presents for their family and friends.

There are also a couple of neighbourhoods that are quite popular and traditional where some other humans and plushies prefer to go shopping not only for Christmas but for some other important holidays, such as Halloween, National Day and New Year.

unusual for most of you in your countries. Another barrio that is popular is named Persa Bío Bío which is a kind of flea open market where you can get lots of unusual things going from Christmas decorations, food products, clothes, toys for children, second hand books and even pets! Yes! It is also forbidden to buy animals in these kinds of places but in Chile regulations are sometimes not followed by all Chileans... Anyway, the persa is a fun place to go window shopping around this time of year, the same as Barrio Meiggs.

For food, at Christmas time we have dinner with family at around 10 pm and we exchange and open our gifts at midnight exactly. I love this part of the celebration. If you are a good plushie, maybe you can get to see Santa Claus, who is called Viejito Pascuero in this part of the world.

I hope *Viejito* visits me this year, and all of you, of course, my dear friends.

So, if you ever come to Chile, please let me know so I can give you a tour of my city. I would be glad to do so.
