Fluffy: "The royal palace?" 😅 (to Cookie:) "Run my friend, run!"




Editorial note: The interview ended unexpectedly in an abrupt fashion, but there are now two very full and happy plushies hiding in a trash can... and there they even made a new friend!

The Tale of Despereaux - Kate DiCamillo

The Tale of Desperaux by children's chapter book author Kate DiCamillo is the charming tale of a mouse, a princess, a rat, a prisoner, a scullery maid, and the power of stories, dreams, love, and honour. The titular character, a mouse who differs sharply in appearance and personality from his fellow mice, falls in love with reading...and a human princess, two things which the rest of the mice condemn. DiCamillo weaves several perspectives into one touching tale of perseverance in the face of adversity, leaving the reader with a sense of hope that someday their own dreams may come true. Being a book for kids, the novel reads fast and the fairytale-like quality of the writing and plot make it worth a read if you have never read it. The Tale of Desperaux was adapted into a 2008 film with mixed reviews, but the 2003 novel has been included in several lists of the Top 100 Children's Books of All Time.

Fahrenheit 451 - Ray Bradbury

This is a story about books, fire, impacting people, and the power to go against a world that went wrong. Humans have a tremendous amount of energy, the energy that can move mountains, fill the world with meaning, and be a guide in this life... But instead, they use it to destroy, disrupt, and burn. The protagonist of Fahrenheit 451 is a fireman whose job is not to put out fires but to start them, burning what's meant to be treasure, the cradle of human wisdom and life – books. He goes against orders and instead goes with his true nature. He is the symbol of uprising that turns around the rooted life values of the society that produced him. He's not a Superman, he's just an average man who faced the defects of society and tries to resist them. Does he succeed or not? Grab the book and find out.



I Capture a Castle - Dodie Smith

The first line and the last of a book often stay with you, and this one starts with "I write this sitting in the kitchen sink" and ends with "Only the margin left to write in now..." (and then a bit more, but we won't give that bit away). We loved every bit of this book, from start to finish. It's about a teenager called Cassandra, her crazy family, the castle they live in, and a couple of American heirs. Cassandra writes her diary and we watch her grow and live her life in a beautiful English landscape. Her narrative is captivating, and the characters, so wonderfully eccentric. It's a book J.K. Rowling loves, and so do we. Oh, and guess who it's written by? The lady who wrote 101 Dalmations!

The Jane Austen Book Club by Karen Joy Fowler (2004)

In Californa, five women and one man form a book club to read Jane Austen's books. Only her books, no other. It's Jocelyn who starts the club. She is around 50, and the first one she invites is her oldest best friend, Sylvia. Sylvia has just gone through a divorce and needs a distraction. Bernadette is the oldest member, and the school teacher, Prudie the youngest. Sylvia's daughter Allegra is also invited, and then, out of the blue, Joceyn invites Gregg, the only man. He is in between the women's ages and no one really knows why he was invited. The group reads one book by Jane Austen for each meeting. They always intend to discuss the books, but somehow, they end up talking about their lives instead. Maybe that's just how Jane Austen's books affect people – they bring the reader's life into another light.

This is a book about a love for literature, about friendships, love, and how to navigate through all the ups and downs of life. It's a bit of a feel-good story with a literary twist.

Book Lovers by Emily Henry (2022)

Nora works as a literary agent in New York and she is very successful. The only thing she loves more than her job is her younger sister, Libby. When Libby is about to have her third baby, she needs a break from her husband and children, and convinces Nora to go on a sisters' get-away to Sunshine Falls in North Carolina. This small town was the setting for one of the most popular feel-good novels published recently, and Libby loved that book. Nora agrees, and together the sisters spend a month in Sunshine Falls. A month that goes no way near how the sisters planned it. Nora keeps bumping into Charlie Lastra, a publisher in New York that she is already acquainted with, but doesn't like at all. And Libby seems to have secret plans, or why else would she sneak away without telling Nora where she is going?

Book Lovers is also a feel-good story, but is more of a regular feel-good with just a hint of books. It builds upon classic elements but also plays with the idea of a feel-good book by comparing what happens to the sisters with events that might occur in a story. This adds an extra layer to this light-hearted and romantic read.

The Book Thief by Markus Zusak (2006)

During World War II, a German girl Liesel is sent to a foster family since her father is a political prisoner and her mother no longer can take care of her. Liesel's younger brother just died. Liesel is placed in the home of Hans and Rosa in a town Liesel has never visited before. Hans and Rosa are very poor, but they take care of Liesel as well as they can. She gets to go to school and makes friends among the neighbouring children. One day, Liesel discovers a stranger in the basement. He is Jewish and hiding from the Nazis. Liesel is very interested in words and books. Books are frequently burned by the Nazis, and Liesel starts stealing books whenever she can. The man in the basement helps her with her reading.

The one telling this story is Death. Death gives an overview of the atrocities of the war, all over the world, at the same time as the reader gets to follow everyday life in the shadow of the war through Liesel and her experiences. Despite the heavy topic, it is still a light read, but it will not leave you without a great impression.

The Giver of Stars by Jojo Moyes (2019)

It's 1937, and Alice has recently arrived from England to Kentucky, where she is settling in with her new husband and father-in-law. She wanted to escape her mundane life at home, and had hoped that Kentucky would bring her more joy and freedom. But Alice's husband shows her no interest, and the very religious father-in-law believes that a woman's place is in the home. When Eleanor Roosevelt's investment in education for the people reaches Alice's new hometown, a library is set up. Since so many people live remotely in the countryside or up in the mountains, the town hires librarians to ride to the library patrons on horseback. Alice applies for the job and soon finds herself part of a group of women that defy all kinds of perils in order to deliver books to the people of rural Kentucky.

This book is based on true events in Kentucky in the 1930s. It's a story of friendship, love, and passion, for both books and humanity. If you like libraries and understand the joy that can be found in a really good book, you will get into this story immediately and keep your fingers crossed for the horse-riding librarians throughout the whole book.

- Bamboo plants can grow up to 90 centimetres in a day, whereas an apple tree grows less than two millimetres a day.
- Some butterfly species have more than 10,000 eyes, but still see worse than birds.
- Elephants only need two hours of sleep per night and can even live without sleep for several days.
- The largest single organism known to date is an armillaria honey fungus, which covers 809 hectares and is probably thousands of years old.
- The blood of mammals is red, that of insects is usually yellow, and lobsters or horseshoe crabs can even have blue blood.
- Up to half a million tons of plastic waste end up in the Mediterranean every year.
- Every year we lose at least 14 million hectares of forest worldwide, especially in the tropics. This corresponds to an area larger than Austria and Switzerland combined


